

IMPORTANT CHANGES AT HOYLAKE: NEW HAZARDS AND ALTERATIONS

The many and important alterations which have recently been carried out on the Hoylake course are of particular public interest because the Royal Liverpool Golf Club is to be the venue for the Open Championship of 1924, as well as for the meeting of the Army Golfing Society. Some of the bigger changes have been effected on the 2nd, which is now a dog-legged hole, the short 7th, or "Dowie," which has been more heavily bunkered, the short "Alps" and the 12th, which have each
